






OAK CREEK EVACUATION AREAS

Emergency Preparedness Tips

1. Create an emergency evacuation plan, including escape routes and a designated meeting point.
2. Prepare a "Go Kit" with food, water, clothing, medications, pet food and personal items for the next 72 hours.
3. Stay informed during the emergency via the Emergency Alert System (EAS) through the radio, television, weather radio and Emergency Notification Systems in Coconino and Yavapai counties and the City of Sedona. Residents can also call the Coconino County Emergency Hotline at (888) 679-8393 during emergencies.
4. Volunteer for a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) or become involved with the American Red Cross.

Slide Fire

On May 20, 2014, the Slide Fire began in Oak Creek Canyon north of Slide Rock State Park along State Route 89A north of Sedona.

The fire charred more than 21,000 acres and has created the potential for severe flooding within Oak Creek and West Fork Canyons and several smaller drainages.

Although natural recovery continues to progress in Oak Creek Canyon one year after the fire, debris-laden and enhanced flows can still be expected in Oak Creek and these risks will persist into the foreseeable future.

With many popular spots in Oak Creek reopening this summer, it is imperative that visitors understand that it is their responsibility to stay vigilant about the threats of flash flooding, debris flows and rock slides during monsoon season.

Increased Hazards Exist

Rock falls, slide debris and flash flooding are likely during and following rain in the region.

Before the Storm

Create an Evacuation Plan

- Where would you, your family or group evacuate?
- Locate a meeting location on high ground where your group will meet or a plan to quickly evacuate.

During and After the Storm

Listen for the warning sirens.

If a siren sounds:

- **Stop** what you're doing.
- **Leave** your possessions.
- **Immediately** get to high ground.
- **Tune** your radio to 92.9 FM for additional information.
