What is the Inter-Tribal Advisory Council?

Established in 2001 by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors, the Coconino County Inter-Tribal Advisory Council (ITAC) acts as an official liaison and communication link between Native American communities and Coconino County governmental agencies.

Function & Purpose

1. Review and make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors concerning existing and proposed city, county, state, federal and tribal legislation affecting Native Americans.
2. Examine and assist in planning policies in the areas of employment, education, housing, health services, community services, the justice system, recreation and land development as they affect or relate to Native American tribal members.
3. Promote cultural and historical activities and events related to Native Americans.

4. Recommend and report findings from studies regarding the current needs of Native Americans to the Board of Supervisors.
5. Host community forums as needed to educate the community and county about Native American issues and concerns.
6. Recommend the appointment of individuals knowledgeable with Native American issues to other county boards, commissions, committees, and other bodies.
7. Request funding for projects and activities from the Board to provide information to Native American communities.

How to Join

The membership is appointed by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors and is comprised of citizens who reside in Coconino County. The Council is composed of not more than fifteen (15) members. Appointed members serve a term of two (2) years. A member can be re-appointed to three (3) terms.
